

The business to be conducted at the annual meeting shall include, but is not limited to the following:


- 1. Approval of 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes.

District 1 Board Candidate - Ronald Schwartau

Tell us a little about yourself:

I have been a member of Nobles Cooperative Electric since 1981. My wife, Connie, and I live in Skandia Township where we retired from operating the family farm, Coorain, Inc. I graduated from the University of Minnesota with a Masters Degree of Agriculture-Food Technology. Prior to farming, I was a research project coordinator at the University of Minnesota. I served in the Army and Air National Guard. While serving as a director of NCE, I completed all of the required courses from NRECA to earn Credentialed Cooperative Director and Board Leadership certificates. I have been on the board since December 1991.

Occupation and responsibilities:

I have recently retired from farming in rural Balaton, but maintain a supporting role in the operations of Coorain Inc.

Community involvement/service:

I am active in Sillerud Lutheran Church, having served on the council multiple times and I sing in the choir. My wife and I are members of and support the activities of the Balaton Chamber of Commerce and Shetek Lutheran Ministries. I have also served several times as an international volunteer helping develop and improve cooperatives in third-world and developing countries.

Leadership positions:

I serve as president of Nobles Cooperative Electric and am a member of the Minnesota Rural Electric Association Board of Directors. From 2004 to 2020, I served on the board of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) and chaired the NRECA International Foundation.

What are the primary issues facing the electric industry and Nobles Cooperative Electric?

The challenges facing all electric cooperatives are getting more difficult each year. Federal and state legislation and regulations are potentially putting the reliability and affordability of our grid at great risk. Even recent actions by the EPA, run counter to the goals set for the national clean energy goals.

Why I want to serve on the Nobles Cooperative Electric Board of Directors:

I want to do all I can to continue to ensure that Nobles Cooperative Electric remains financially secure and relevant to our members and communities.



District 2 Board Candidate - Lee Andrew York

Tell us a little about yourself:

I've been a lifelong resident of Murray County, specifically the Lake Wilson area. I'm married to my wife Joan, and we have two children, Brian and Kayla. I graduated from Southwest State University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Ag Economics. Upon graduation, I started a farming operation that continues today. I've been a Nobles Cooperative Electric member since 1974.

Occupation and responsibilities:

We operate a diversified grain and livestock operation with my son and brother.

Community involvement/service:

I'm a member of Lake Wilson United Methodist Church, the Lake Wilson Community Club, Lake Wilson Post 285 Sons of the American Legion and Slayton Post #64 Legion Riders. I currently serve as director for District 2 on the Nobles Cooperative Electric Board.

Leadership positions:

I currently serve on the Nobles Cooperative Electric Board, having served as secretary/treasurer and currently vice president. I also serve as the Nobles representative on the board of Great River Energy, serving as board treasurer. I've served as past president of Hadley Farmer Co-op Elevator, past president of the Lake Wilson Economic Development Authority, past president of Lake Wilson Community Club and currently chair of the administrative board of Lake Wilson United Methodist church.

What are the primary issues facing the electric industry and Nobles Cooperative Electric?

One issue that will impact our system and our members is the transition from fossil fuel to renewable sources for generation, as well as self-generation or distributed generation. The challenge is maintaining reliability and affordability for all of our members. Our power supplier, Great River Energy, is ahead of schedule in this transition. Another issue is keeping costs down which affects rates, but spending on maintenance and equipment will continue to maintain reliability.

Why I want to serve on the Nobles Cooperative Electric Board of Directors:

I would like to serve to be able to help shape the policies that will keep our electric service reliable and affordable into the future for our members. Also, the promotion of economic development in our service territory for the benefit of our members.



District 7 Board Candidate - Randy Donahue

Tell us a little about yourself:

I was born and raised in the Brewster, MN, area and graduated from Brewster High School. I attended Buena Vista University obtaining a bachelor's degree majoring in criminal justice and agency administration. My wife, Lorna, is an ER Nurse and we have two adult children and one grandson.

Occupation and responsibilities:

Leadership positions:


Currently serve on the nominating committee for Nobles Cooperative Electric.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS





These financial statements are summarized, and the auditor's report will be available at the cooperative's office. Please note that the audit was not completed at the time of printing.



The annual meeting of the members of Nobles Cooperative Electric was held via a conference call at 7 p.m. on April 11, 2023. This was pursuant to notice duly published 15 days prior to the holding of the meeting, as required by Nobles Cooperative Electric's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

Ronald Schwartau, president of the board of directors, welcomed the members.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Schwartau, who presided. Director Cindy Hokeness, secretary of the cooperative, kept the minutes of the meeting.

The agenda and annual meeting notice were mailed to each member of the cooperative. A motion was made, seconded, and carried to approve the agenda.

President Schwartau stated that the annual report had been provided to the membership prior to the annual meeting and constitutes the business and fiscal reports of the cooperative.

The minutes of the last annual meeting of the members, as held on April 5, 2022, were printed in the 2022 Annual Report. There being no corrections, additions, or deletions, a motion was made, seconded, and carried to approve the minutes as printed.

Nobles Cooperative Electric's Bylaws state that a quorum is established when a question is submitted to a vote by mail and there are 50 or more mailed votes received on behalf of the cooperative. Secretary Hokeness stated that before the April 11 Conference Call Annual Meeting, more than 50 mail-in ballots were received and a quorum was established as per Article II, Section 7 of the Bylaws.

Chairman Schwartau appointed Attorney Chad Felstul as parliamentarian for the meeting.

Chad Felstul, attorney for the cooperative, stated that the Notice of Annual Meeting was published in the Murray County Wheel-Herald and the Southwestern Peach for one week starting on March 6, 2023, and the Worthington Daily Globe for one week starting on March 8, 2023.

The Notice of Annual Meeting was also in the Annual Report mailed to members on March 10.

The balloting and voting procedures for the election of directors and nominating committee members were explained by Attorney Felstul. Ballots were mailed to 5,268 members on March 17 at their last known address as shown by the records of the cooperative, proven by a Certificate of Mailing by Dairyland Power Cooperative. The ballots were sent to Pemberton Law, P.L.L.P. for counting.

Attorney Felstul announced the ballot totals, which were as follows:
